Services Added to TRH One Bedroom Apartments

Turner Retirement Homes currently has one bedroom apartments available. These units are single level, with only four and five units to a complex.



They are approximately 575 square feet. Most are located close to the TRH Dining Hall. The one pictured above is a block away. TRH is adding two additional services for those who would like one meal a day in the TRH dining room and weekly housekeeping.

Package Deal:

For \$1,000 a month this package includes:

- Water, sewer, electricity and garbage
- Maintenance
- One meal a day (spouse: \$150 a month extra)
- Housekeeping (one hour a week)
- Chapel, Bible study, choir, etc
- Christian Fellowship and numerous activities
